GLRC RESEARCHERS IN THE MEDIA

- Early this week, *The Hill Times* published '[Profiting from the pandemic](#),' an opinion piece by Assistant Professor Carlo Fanelli (Social Science, York University) and Assistant Professor Heather Whiteside (Political Science, University of Waterloo). From the article: "If there is a crisis to be found in the earnings of Canada's Big Six banks, it isn't in how much their profits have been reduced, but rather how high they've remained in the face of a global health and economic emergency."
- In May 2019, the GLRC hosted 'Race, Class, and Collective Bargaining by Riot,' a talk with Dr. Simon Black (Labour Studies, Brock University) that followed a screening of the documentary film he co-produced—"It Takes A Riot: Race, Rebellion, Reform"—about the May 4th, 1992 march in Toronto against police brutality. In his talk, Dr. Black asked in what ways we can understand the uprising as a form of "collective bargaining by riot" and why the events of May 4th, 1992 are not understood as "labour history."
