The Global Labour Research Centre (GLRC) engages in the study of work, employment and labour, organizing its activities around four globally situated research clusters: (1) the impact of the changing nature of work and employment on labour rights; (2) the interrelationships between migration, citizenship and work; (3) gender relations in work and labour movements; and (4) the revitalization of workers' movements. A hub for pan-university research collaboration, the GLRC's community engagement model encompasses a range of labour and community partners and the centre aims to promote internationalization through the study of work, employment, and labour by engaging in research activities with leading international scholars, public figures, organizations, and research institutes.

Faculty Engagement

Global Labour Speaker Series

The GLRC organized the Global Labour Speaker Series, now in its second year. The series featured eight talks or panel discussions focused on the Centre's four research themes, and drew healthy and diverse participation from across York, from other universities in the region, and from community members. Three speakers were from outside Canada, two from the United States and one from Argentina. The average attendance at these sessions was 20, and 18 York departments and programs were represented (see Appendix 1 for details). The series was financially supported by the following York units: International Development Studies, Geography, Social Science, Sociology, Work & Labour Studies, the CRC in Comparative Political Economy, the CRC in the Political Economy of Gender and Work, and the Closing the Employment Standards Enforcement Gap Research Initiative.

Student Engagement and Training

Global Labour Reading Group

The GLRC continued to host the Global Labour Reading Group in Fall 2013 and Winter 2014. The reading group met for a total of five sessions through the academic year. Participation ranged from 6 to 20 members per session, including graduate students from Sociology, Political Science, Geography, and Gender, Feminist & Women's Studies, two post-doctoral fellows (both hosted at York University), a doctoral student from OISE, and a visiting doctoral student from Universidad Andina Simón Bolívar (Ecuador).

Graduate Student Training

The Centre's work was supported by three PhD Graduate Assistants (Guio Jacinto, Chris Bailey and Brad Walchuk, all Political Science) in Summer 2013, and three MA Graduate Assistants (Saadna Sherifdeen, Sina Azimi, and Keith Gonzalez Sujo, all Political Science) from September 2013 to April 2014. The GAs' tasks included coordinating the Global Labour Reading Group, promoting GLRC events (including the Global Labour Speaker Series), and developing the GLRC website. On November 6, 2013, the GLRC also co-sponsored with the MA Program in International Development Studies a methods workshop for graduate students planning to conduct fieldwork with union and social justice organizations, led by Dr. Maurizio Atzeni from CONICET in Buenos Aires, Argentina and attended by 19 MA and PhD students.

Know Your Rights: High School Labour Rights Project

In collaboration with the Workers' Arts and Heritage Centre, Dr. Suzanne Mills of McMaster University's School of Labour Studies (and GLRC Faculty Affiliate), and District 21 of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers Federation (Hamilton-Wentworth), the GLRC continued to develop its Know Your Rights workplace rights education program. This year, using GLRC materials on the Employment Standards Act, this group developed a 70-minute curriculum for high school students on identifying and responding to workplace rights violations. This curriculum was delivered at Hill Park Secondary School in Hamilton to 60 co-op students on April 9, 2013 by a fourth-year McMaster labour studies student.

Community Engagement

Workshops

In February 2014, the GLRC hosted a workshop for union activists entitled “Whole-Worker Organizing: Building an Effective Contract Campaign” led by US labour organizer Jane McAlevey. Co-organized with Sarah DeClerck and Jonah Gindin (CUPE staff) and Morna Ballantyne (former staff with CUPE and PSAC) and delivered on a cost-recovery basis, the 35 workshop attendees represented ten different labour organizations from Toronto, Hamilton, Ottawa and Windsor (see Appendix 1).

Knowledge Mobilization

Publications

The GLRC continued to host the e-journal *Just Labour* through 2013-14. Co-Directors Ross and Thomas served on the *JL* Editorial Committee along with Professor Norene Pupo (Sociology) and Editorial Assistant Jason Aprile. In Summer 2013, *Just Labour* Volume 20 was published, which contained a series of articles responding to a commentary originally presented by Andrew Jackson (2012-2014 Packer Chair in Social Justice) in December 2012 as part of the Global Labour Speakers Series. This volume has received 260 hits since its publication. Overall, *Just Labour* has received 3597 unique hits in the past year. In addition, Centre faculty affiliates have been very active in the dissemination of published research linked to the GLRC’s core themes (see Appendix 2).

Online Profile and Communications Infrastructure

The GLRC began to develop an online presence with the launch of a GLRC website (www.yorku.ca/glrc), Facebook page (<https://www.facebook.com/glrcyork>), and Twitter feed (https://twitter.com/GLRC_York). The Facebook page has also been used to create specific event pages for the Global Labour Speaker Series. As of April 30, 2014, the Facebook page is followed by 181 people, and the Twitter feed by 86 people. The GLRC also established two email listservs (GLRC-Announce (317 subscribers) and GL-Reading (50 subscribers), one for general announcements and the other to support the graduate student reading group. Finally, the GLRC was featured in 8 YFile stories highlighting our Speaker Series.

Visiting Scholars

In Fall 2013, the GLRC hosted Kevin Skerrett, National Pension Researcher for the Canadian Union of Public Employees, who was on a year-long sabbatical. Skerrett participated actively in Centre activities, including speaking in the Global Labour Speaker Series and leading the six-session workshop series Pension Funds, Unions, and Working Class Strategy. The GLRC co-sponsored this series in conjunction with Toronto’s Centre for Social Justice, the CRC in Comparative Political Economy, and Socialist Project. The GLRC also continued to co-host (with Political Science) Andrew Jackson, the Packer Visiting Professor in Social Justice, in the final year of this appointment. The GLRC Co-Directors also participated in the selection of the next Packer Visiting Professor, Fay Faraday, whom the Centre will co-host from 2014-2016.

Faculty Engagement / Conferences / Workshops

In 2014-15, the GLRC will:

- host an open house event in September 2014, to invite university and community members to hear about the Centre's work and future plans. This event will include a

presentation by US-based author, labour activist, and scholar Bill Fletcher Jr. This event will be funded through contributors to the Global Labour Speaker Series as well as the LA&PS Research Events and Outreach Fund;

- deliver The Global Labour Speaker Series, which will include three public events in each of the Fall and Winter terms;
- co-sponsor the *Union Matters* book launch May 21, 2014, in conjunction with the Canadian Foundation for Labour Rights;
- organize conference panels (at the Canadian Association for Work and Labour Studies conference, May 2014) and a stand-alone workshop (in Fall 2014) on deindustrialization, which will include researchers from academic institutions, trade unions, and community organizations.

Student Engagement

The GLRC will:

- continue to host the Global Labour Reading Group, which will meet four times per semester in each of the Fall and Winter terms;
- fund three PhD students as MFGAs (Lacey Croft, Chris Bailey, and Guio Jacinto) in Summer 2014, who will work on a range of research and community engagement projects;
- develop the Know Your Rights project, working with undergraduate students in the Work & Labour Studies Program to deliver peer education about workplace rights on campus. We will add two new fact sheets to the KYR series, update the two existing fact sheets as well as the larger KYR booklet. We will also expand the KYR program to Toronto-area high schools in collaboration with members of the OSSTF. This project will also include an application to the Law Foundation of Ontario for funding to develop a workplace rights smartphone application.

Community Engagement

In 2014-15, the GLRC will continue to develop and deliver workshops on a cost-recovery basis to labour and community organizations. These workshops will focus on various aspects of capacity building, in keeping with our focus on labour movement revitalization. In October 2014, the Centre will deliver a workshop on Strategic Corporate Research for led by Dr. Tom Juravich of the Labor Centre at University of Massachusetts – Amherst.

Visiting Scholars

In addition to co-hosting Fay Faraday, incoming Packer Visiting Professor in Social Justice, the GLRC will support an application by Theodoros Fouskas (PhD, Sociology, Panteion University of Social and Political Sciences, Greece) for a Banting post-doctoral fellowship, to be held the GLRC and supervised by Prof. Mark Thomas. The GLRC will also apply for a visiting professorship for Jane McAlevey, to be held in 2015-16 and during which she will contribute to teaching in the Work and Labour Studies Program, write a manual on innovative union organizing strategies, and deliver additional training workshops for union and community members.
