The GLRC has a total of 24 active York faculty affiliates. As York's only Organized Research Unit fully located within the Faculty of Liberal Arts and Professional Studies, the GLRC draws its principal membership from LAPS' departments and programs (21), including Social Science (6), Sociology (4), Geography (4), Political Science (3), History (2), Gender, Sexuality & Women's Studies (1), and Human Resource Management (1). Membership is also drawn from Osgoode Hall Law School (2) and Fine Arts (1).

The GLRC also has 27 graduate student affiliates and 16 external faculty affiliates.

## 4. Mandate

The Global Labour Research Centre (GLRC) engages in the study of work, employment and labour, organizing its activities around four globally situated research clusters: (1) the impact of the changing nature of work and employment on labour rights; (2) the interrelationships between migration, citizenship and work; (3) gender relations in work and labour movements; and (4) the revitalization of workers' movements. A hub for pan-university research collaboration, the GLRC's community engagement model encompasses a range of labour and community partners and the centre aims to promote internationalization through

the study of work, employment, and labour by engaging in research activities with leading international scholars, public figures, organizations, and research institutes.

## External Networks & Collaboration

In Winter 2015, the Centre for Labour Management Relations (CLMR) at Ryerson University hosted a meeting of directors of research centres and academic programs in the fields of Labour Studies and Industrial Relations based in southern Ontario. Dr. Thomas attended on behalf of the GLRC. Other participants included representatives from the University of Toronto Centre for Industrial Relations, Queen's University Industrial Relations Centre, Brock University Centre for Labour Studies, and McMaster University School of Labour Studies. The purpose of the meeting was to explore the potential for creating a southern Ontario network of Labour Studies and

Industrial Relations programs and research centres, and to consider potential initiatives for collaboration. As a second event based on this initiative, the CLMR is organizing a public forum on the Government of Ontario's Changing Workplace Review in June 2015 and the GLRC Co-Directors have been invited to attend.

#### **Faculty Engagement**

#### **Global Labour Speaker Series**

The GLRC organized the highly successful Global Labour Speaker Series, now in its third year. The series featured thirteen talks or panel discussions focused on the Centre's four research themes, and drew healthy and diverse participation from across York, other universities in the region, and community members. Three of these talks were cosponsored, one with CERLAC, one with OISE, and one with The Journal of Studies in Political Economy. six speakers were from outside Canada, two from the United States, one from the UK, one from Norway, one from Guatamala, and one from Australia. Average attendance at these sessions was 30 (up from an average of 20 last year), and 18 York departments and programs were represented (see Appendix 1 for details). The series was financially supported by the following York units: Office of the Dean Liberal Arts and Professional Studies; Office of the Dean Osgoode Hall Law School; the departments of Geography, Social Science, Sociology, and Political Economy; the Canada Research Chair in Comparative Political Economy; the Canada Research Chair in the Political Economy of Gender and Work; and the Closing the Employment Standards Enforcement Gap Research Initiative.

## **Student Engagement and Training**

## Global Labour Reading Group

The GLRC continued to host the Global Labour Reading Group in 2014-15. The reading group met three times over the academic year, but was interrupted by the CUPE 3903 strike in March 2015. Participants included graduate students from Sociology, Political Science, Geography, and Gender, Feminist & Women's Studies.

## Graduate Student Training

The GLRC's work was supported by three graduate assistants in 2014-15, two in Summer 2015 (Lacey Croft, Chris Bailey) and one in Fall-Winter 2014-15 (Dimitris Kagialaris). A fourth GA (Lindsay Cheong) was shared by the GLRC and the Packer Chair in Social Justice, but the student withdrew from their Master's program in early 2015. The GAs' tasks included coordinating the Global Labour Reading Group, updating the *Know York Rights* materials, and developing the online database for the GLRC library.

## **Resource Room and Library**

In Summer 2014, the GLRC added to its resource room two computers for student use, as well as a library collection built out of donations from retiring York faculty and community-based supporters of the GLRC. Now standing at 378 volumes, the library continues to be added to as more faculty retire. The collection is catalogued on a free, public database called LibraryThing and available for use in the Resource Room.

#### Graduate Specialization and Summer School in Global Labour Studies

In response to a call for submissions from the VPRI, in February 2015 the co-directors developed and submitted a proposal for a graduate specialization in Global Labour Studies, anchored by a Summer School to be offered to graduate students seeking the specialization and to community members seeking university-based experiential learning opportunities. This initiative holds potential to provide a much-needed opportunity for current graduate students at York, and to attract new graduate students, as currently there is no formal graduate credential offered in the area at York. The Graduate Specialization will initially be open to graduate students (M.A., PhD) enrolled in the following York University graduate programs: Sociology, Political Science, Social & Political Thought, Development Studies, Socio-Legal Studies, Gender, Feminist & Women's Studies, History, and Geography, with the possibility of opening the specialization to additional graduate programs once the specialization has been initiated. The Summer School in Global Labour Studies will consist of a three-week course taught at York University in the summer semester. It will be open to both graduate students and community members with an interest in the study of work and labour in a global context, and will feature instruction by both academic and community-based practitioners as guest lecturers.

#### Know Your Rights: High School Labour Rights Project

The GLRC continued to work on updating the materials associated with the project.

#### **Retail Action Working Group**

In February 2015, the GLRC established the Retail Action Working Group, designed for York undergraduate students working in retail who need information about how to defend their workplace rights and improve their work lives. The RAWG has had two planning meetings, including representatives from Unifor staff who represent unionized retail workers. The GLRC sent one of its faculty affiliates and one undergraduate student to the Unifor Retail and Wholesale Workers Sectoral Conference at Port Elgin, Ontario in March 2015, to make connections with other workers already organized in retail.

## **Community Engagement**

#### Workshops

In October 2014, the GLRC hosted a two-day workshop for 33 graduate students and union and community activists entitled *Strategic Corporate Research: Looking Inside the Corporate World*. Led by Professor Tom Juravich from the University of Massachusetts Amherst and co-sponsored with the Toronto & York Region Labour Council, the workshop was delivered on a cost-recovery basis. The hands-on workshop helped participants identify and explore public sources of information on a wide variety of firms, and define how to use this information to build innovative and creative campaigns (see Appendix 1 for details on participants).

In March 2015, GLRC Co-Director Stephanie Ross had preliminary discussions with Susan Nosov, Director of Education for the Canadian Labour Congress, about the possibility of partnering with the CLC to deliver labour studies education to union leaders and activists. The CLC is engaged in an internal review of their labour education programs, and their potential decentralization and delivery through partnership organizations (of which the GLRC would be one). The GLRC will continue with these discussions in the coming year.

# Knowledge Mobilization *Publications*

From the time of its initial chartering in July 2013, the GLRC acted as a host to the e-journal *Just Labour: A Canadian Journal of Work and Society.* Co-Directors Ross and Thomas, along with GLRC affiliate Dr. Norene Pupo, served as co-editors for the journal. In Fall 2014, *Just Labour* published its final issue and the journal's editorial board disbanded. The decision to cease publication was due to a lack of resources (both finances and personnel) needed to sustain the journal's operations. Since ceasing publication in Fall 2014, the GLRC has engaged in a digital archiving initiative with the assistance of York's Scott Library to archive all 22 volumes of *Just Labour* so as to ensure continued access to the journal. The archiving of the journal was completed in January 2015.

The GLRC also co-sponsored the book launch for *Union Matters: Advancing Democracy, Economic Equality, and Social Justice*, at the Royal York Hotel on May 21, 2014, in conjunction with the Canadian Foundation for Labour Rights. This book features chapters by three GLRC affiliates.

In addition, Centre faculty affiliates have been very active in the dissemination of published research linked to the GLRC's core themes, including 19 different kinds of publications. GLRC affiliates also gave 42 Conference and invited presentations and were quoted in 34 media stories (see Appendix 2).

#### **Online Profile and Communications Infrastructure**

The GLRC's online presence and following continues to grow. We maintain a website, Facebook page and Twitter feed. All GLRC talks are audio recorded and the files are available on our website. The Facebook page has also been used to create specific event pages for the Global Labour Speaker Series. As of April 30, 2015, the Facebook page is followed by 398 people, up 120% from last year. The GLRC Twitter feed has 168 followers, up 107% from last year. The GLRC's two email listservs have also grown. GLRC-Announce now has 412 subscribers (up by nearly 100 from last year). GL-Reading, which supports the graduate student reading group, has 62 subscribers (up by 12 from last year). Finally, the GLRC was featured in eight YFile stories highlighting our Speaker Series.

## **Visiting Scholars**

In 2014-15, the GLRC had two visiting scholars: Fay Faraday, a Toronto-based lawyer with a labour and social justice oriented practice and current Packer Chair in Social Justice; and Carlo Fanelli, a post-doctoral fellow at Ryerson University. Faraday was especially active in GLRC activities, as she delivered one talk in the speaker series and acted as a discussant in another. Fanelli is working with Dr. Thomas and Dr. Vosko in the development of a SSHRC Connection Grant application for a workshop on 'Rethinking the New Canadian Political Economy'. The materials presented at the workshop will be developed into a book manuscript, to which Fanelli will contribute as a co-editor (with Thomas and Vosko). The GLRC also supported the applications of two post-doctoral fellowships (a Banting post-doctoral fellowship submitted Theodoros Fouskas and a SSHRC post-doctoral fellowship submitted by James Nugent), but neither was successful.

## **GLRC Advancement Plan**

The Co-Directors and Centre Coordinator have developed an Advancement Plan *(see Appendix 3)*, which they will pursue throughout 2015-16 in attempt to secure more permanent external funding sources to support the Centre and its activities.

## Faculty Engagement / Conferences / Workshops

In 2015-16, the GLRC will:

 host a two-day conference on the right to strike in October 2015, featuring a keynote address by Justice Rosalie Abella, and drawing scholars from across the country to discuss the implications of the January 2015 decision by the Supreme Court of Canada. This event will be funded by the CRC in Comparative Political Economy as well as applications to the LA&PS Research Events and Outreach Fund;

- deliver the Global Labour Speaker Series, which will include one public event in Summer 2015 related to the Pan-Am Games and three public events in each of the Fall and Winter terms;
- organize a one-day workshop titled 'Change and Continuity: Rethinking the New Canadian Political Economy'. This workshop, led by Mark Thomas, Leah Vosko, and Carlo Fanelli, will bring together leading scholars working in the Canadian Political Economy tradition to engage in a dialogue regarding the current state of the field. The workshop will produce a set of papers that will be developed into a book manuscript for publication with McGill-Queen's University Press.
- organize a two-day workshop titled 'The Rise of Anti-Unionism in Canada." This workshop, led by Stephanie Ross and Larry Savage, will bring together scholars (many of whom are GLRC affiliates) to present draft chapters for a book manuscript of the same name, to be published in Fernwood's *Labour in Canada* series.
- Host four networking sessions for faculty and graduate students—one for each of the GLRC's four research themes—to explore potential collaborations, including grant applications.

## Student Engagement

In 2015-16, the GLRC will:

- continue to host the Global Labour Reading Group, which will meet three times per semester in each of the Fall and Winter terms;
- develop and submit the proposal for a Graduate Summer School in Global Labour Studies to Faculty of Graduate Studies by Fall 2015;
- organize a Graduate Student Symposium in Fall 2015, a day-long conference in which York students affiliated with the GLRC will present their research;
- support the development of the Retail Action Working Group through Summer 2015, with the goal of establishing a Unifor Community Chapter for students working in retail by Fall 2015;
- develop the Know Your Rights project, working with undergraduate students in the Work & Labour Studies Program to deliver peer education about workplace rights on campus. We will add two new fact sheets to the KYR series, update the two existing fact sheets as well as the larger KYR booklet. In collaboration with the Workers' Arts and Heritage Centre in Hamilton, we will also expand the KYR program to Toronto-area high schools. This project will also include an application to the Law Foundation of Ontario for funding to develop a workplace rights smartphone application.

## **Community Engagement**

In 2015-16, the GLRC will

- develop and deliver one workshop on a cost-recovery basis to labour and community organizations. This workshop will focus on an aspect of capacity building, in keeping with our focus on labour movement revitalization;
- deliver at least one session per semester of the Global Labour Speaker Series at a time and place more accessible to community members outside the university;

- continue discussions with the CLC's Director of Education to develop partnerships for delivering labour studies curriculum for the Labour College of Canada, as well as the development of a certificate accredited by the School of Continuing Studies for nondegree students;
- organize and support the participation of GLRC affiliates in the Government of Ontario's Changing Workplace Review, including presentations at public consultations to be held in Fall 2015.

## Knowledge Mobilization

In 2015-16, the GLRC will

- launch a working paper series that will include both longer academic papers as well as shorter commentaries on current issues, developed in conjunction with presentations given through the Global Labour Speakers Series;
- Develop capacity to livestream all talks in the Global Labour Speaker Series (subject to participant approval);
- Produce a regular e-newsletter highlighting GLRC activities, affiliates, and developments linked to the Centre's four research themes;
- Expand the GLRC's Twitter following through more active use of this tool, in particular to highlight the work and activities of GLRC affiliates and to live-tweet GLRC events;
- Develop, in partnership with the Canadian Association for Work and Labour Studies, an online database of work and labour researchers in Canada, highlighting areas of expertise and current research projects.

**Joo-Cheong Tham** is an Associate Professor at the Law Faculty, University of Melbourne. He has published extensively in his key research areas, the regulation of precarious work and political finance law. He has also undertaken considerable research into counter-terrorism laws. **John Grundy** is a SSHRC Postdoctoral Researcher in the Department of Political Science at Wilfrid Laurier University. His research interests are labour market policy, public administration and equity policy. His current research focuses on employment standards enforcement in Ontario and the administration of the Employment Insurance program.

**Alan Hall** is Professor of Sociology and Director of the Master of Employment Relations program at Memorial University. Prior to joining Memorial in 2013, he was the Director of labour studies at the University of Windsor. Dr. Hall's research research interests include occupational health and safety, policing and enforcing labour related laws and regulations, workplace politics, and employment relations

Andrea Noack Dr. Noack has a long-standing interest in understanding the history and politics of knowledge production in Canada. In particular, she focuses on how practices of survey design work as a form of governing and regulation. Her current research focuses on the development and discontinuation of the Canadian Census "long-form". She also maintains a commitment to community-engaged research by participating in research teams investigating working conditions in Canada's public sector, precarious work in Ontario, and the enforcement of employment standards. Dr. Noack's commitment to teaching statistics has also prompted her to investigate the effects of interactive teaching techniques and alternative pedagogies on students' learning, especially in traditionally difficult subject areas, such as physics.

**Elliot Siemiatycki** completed his PhD in Geography at UBC in 2013. He is now a Postdoctoral Fellow at York University. Dr. Siemiatycki has an MA in Geography from York University and BA in Industrial Relations from McGill University.

**Mark Thomas** Mark Thomas is Associate Professor in the Department of Sociology. His research interests are in the areas of political economy and economic sociology, with a primary research focus on the regulation of labour standards at local, national, and transnational scales. He is the author of *Regulating Flexibility: The Political Economy of Employment Standards* (2009, McGill-Queens), co-editor (with N. Pupo) of *Interrogating the New Economy: Restructuring Work in the 21<sup>st</sup> Century* (2010, University of Toronto Press) and co-editor (with D. Brock and R. Raby) of *Power and Everyday Practices* (2012, Nelson), and has published in journals including *Labor Studies Journal, Studies in Political Economy, Economic and Labour Relations Review*, and *Journal of Industrial Relations*. Current areas of research include: the regulation of transnational labour standards; the enforcement of employment standards legislation in Canada; and the intersections between labour organizing and populist movements in Anglo-American contexts.

**Eric Tucker** Professor Eric Tucker has been teaching at Osgoode Hall Law School since 1981 and served as Graduate Program Director from 1998 to 2001. He has published extensively in the fields of occupational health and safety regulation and labour law. Professor Tucker has been involved in law reform initiatives through his participation on the board of Injured Workers' Consultants, a community legal clinic, and as a member of the steering committee of the Bancroft Institute, a grassroots organization that aims to promote research responsive to workers' needs. He has co-authored a study of the legal definition of employment for the Law Commission of Canda and a study of reproductive hazards in the workplace for the Royal Commission on New Reproductive Technologies. His published work includes *Self-Employed Workers Organize: Law, Policy and Unions* (with Cynthia Cranford, Judy Fudge, and Leah Vosko) (Montreal and Kingston: McGill-Queen's University Press, 2005); *Labour Before the Law: Workers' Collective Action and the Canadian State, 1900-1948* (with Judy Fudge)

(Toronto: Oxford University Press, 2001); and Administering Danger in the Workplace: The Law and Politics of Occupational Health and Safety Regulation in Ontario, 1850-1914 (Toronto: University of Toronto Press, 1990). He also edited Working Disasters: The Politics of Recognition and Response (New York: Baywood Publishing Company, Inc., 2006).

Leah Vosko Leah F. Vosko is Professor and Canada Research Chair in Feminist Political Economy at York University. Professor Vosko is the author of Temporary Work: The Gendered Rise of a Precarious Employment Relationship (University of Toronto Press, 2000) and coauthor of Self-Employed Workers Organize: Law, Policy and Unions (McGill-Queen's University Press, 2005 with Cranford, Fudge, and Tucker). She is co-editor of *Changing* Canada: Political Economy as Transformation (McGill-Queen's University Press, 2003 with Clement), Challenging the Market: The Struggle to Regulate Work and Income (McGill-Queen's University Press, 2004 with Stanford), and Gender and the Contours of Precarious Employment (Routledge, 2009, with MacDonald and Campbell) as well as editor of Precarious Employment: Understanding Labour Market Insecurity in Canada (McGill-Queen's University Press, 2006). Her writings have also appeared in venues such as Comparative Labor Law and Policy Journal, Industrial Relations/ Relations Industrielles, Social Indicators Research, The Cambridge Journal of Regional Economics and Economic and Industrial Democracy. Professor Vosko's latest book, Managing the Margins: Gender, Citizenship and the International Regulation of Precarious Employment (2010) is published with Oxford University Press, UK. Since 2001, she has overseen collaborative Gender and Work Database-Comparative Perspectives on Precarious Employment Database project (GWD-CPD) involving co-investigators from across Europe and North America as well as Australia (www.genderwork.ca).
